
A reminder that year 7 placement forms have been sent home to all year 6 students.

If arriving late at school...

- 1. Parents must accompany their child to the office to sign in and collect a Late Pass. If parents do not attend the office with their child, the late arrival is recorded as "Not Approved" and parents will be expected to explain the absence at a later date.

We ask all parents to assist in this matter so that all students are accounted for and safely make their way to class.


Remember, any time that your child is not is class is valuable learning time missed.

using The Very Hungry Caterpillar, we loved talking about what he ate





The students loved celebrating our Mums and special people with our Mother's Day open afternoon and so much fun was had when we ended the week with our Colour Explosion Fun Run!






Year 1



It was lovely to celebrate the Mother's Day afternoon with the mums and nans in our learning spaces.


In Reading, we have been working on making inferences using picture prompts and text clues in the story. Students worked in groups asking and answering inferential questions.

In Writing, we have been working on writing a persuasive piece. Students were given options like 'Chocolate is better than chips'



In Maths, students have been learning the features of analogue clocks. They used mini clocks to show o'clock and half past times. Also, students have been learning about the different units of time like seconds, minutes,

hours and days. The Year 1s are beginning to understand the correlation between analogue and

with playing cards.

We have made it past the halfway mark of Term 2 and students have had wonderful learning weeks! In Reading, students have been focusing on how to make connections to the texts they are reading. This includes making text to self, text to text and text to world connections using the class mentor text and their own books.

They have been learning about this to help with their comprehension skills.



In Writing, students have been working on our persuasive unit by focusing on how to organise their writing and using language to convince others of their opinion. This week our topic is "Are Cats or Dogs Better Pets?" The teachers are very keen to read the students responses and whether they agree or disagree with them.

In maths, students have been learning about multiplication and the different strategies we can use when multiplying numbers together.

Students have enjoyed using hands on materials and board games to enhance their number skills.

Over the last fortnight students have enjoyed participating in many school-wide events such as the Mother's Day afternoon, Colour Explosion Fun Run as well as celebrating Education Week!



Year 3



What an exciting two weeks our Year 3s have had! The students have enjoyed taking part in several school events including The Colour Explosion Fun Run, Mother's Day activities and our Literacy and Numeracy afternoon. It has been wonderful to welcome all our families into our learning space. In Reading, students have been practising the skill of prediction



and using evidence to make reasonable predictions. The students have been making these predictions before, during and after reading as well as reflecting on their predictions to see if they were correct. In Writing, this week students will be sharing their picture story books with the preps. They have worked incredibly hard on these stories and should be very proud of their efforts. In Maths, the Year 3s are learning about length. Students have been competing in the Potato Olympics where they have created a Potato athlete. The Olympic events have included



long jump, sprint, diving and shot put. Using formal and informal units, the students have measured how far the potato has travelled. We can't wait to see which Potato athlete takes out the gold medal!

Year 4

We are nearly halfway through Term 2 and the Year 4 students have been working incredibly hard in their

learning! In Reading, the students have been finding the main idea of the text by locating key words and trying to detect what the book was mostly about. We have read texts such as Jessica's Box, The Library Magician and Karl the spider. In Writing, we have looked at different tones' authors have written using silly, joyful, adventurous and brave. Students have practised writing their ideas





in different tones to entice the reader.

The Year 5 students have been working through a range of activities in angles, using protractors and rulers. We have continued our research projects in Geography, focusing on researching our chosen countries waste management as well as renewable resources. Teachers and students are eagerly awaiting camp and we can't wait to share with you all the fun and excitement that camp life brings.

Year 5



A recent visit by author Adam Wallace was a huge hit with the Year 5 students. He was able to inspire them to create some fantastic drawings to feature in their next piece of writing. In Maths, students have worked enthusiastically on division problems discovering that there are many different strategies they can use. In Reading and Writing students have been working on

procedural and persuasive texts, focusing on fact, opinion, and text structure. In Curriculum Connections, students have been learning about immigration during the Gold Rush and significant people in the early years of Australian History. Students appreciated having their parents and special

visitors in the classroom during the Mother's Day afternoon and enjoyed some mindful colouring and activities. On Friday they enthusiastically participated in the Colour Explosion Fun Run Fundraiser getting colorfully messy.

Year 6



The Year 6 students have enjoyed actively participating in the Winter

Lightning Prem practice sessions as the competition approaches swiftly in Week 10. In Writing, students have focused on using conjunctions and transition words in persuasive speeches, texts, and debates. During Reading, students have begun having a deeper look into illustrations and how they enhance meaning to a book through style, colour, texture etc. In Maths, year 6s have started our shape unit of



work, where we look at real world examples and applications of different shapes. Students have been eagerly awaiting the Colour Explosion Fun Run this term and were incredibly pumped to participate and cheer on the entire school. Safe to say there was not a white t-shirt remaining after this colourful event.

Wellbeing and Respectful Relationships

Recently, we ran a staff professional learning session on Inclusive Education. In Victoria, schools must be legal obligations to ensure reasonable adjustments for students with

disabilities are being made. This is because we want all students to be welcomed, accepted and engaged so that they can participate, achieve and thrive in school life and beyond.

To be successful inclusive education has to meet certain benchmarks. To that end, the department developed the SHARE acronym. It means that inclusive education:

- has to involve students, and their families, in decision-making processes and view them as respected partners in education
- needs to ensure that every student is treated with dignity and respect
- needs to focus on a strengths-based, personalised approach to education that celebrates and welcomes differences
- needs to respect and uphold legal obligations
- must employ evidence-based practices that are effective in responding to individual student needs and improving student outcomes

At Cranbourne East Primary School, we take inclusive education very seriously so that we can ensure every student is valued and supported to fully participate, learn, develop and succeed.

Science

We've just had our last week of our Earth and Space unit exploring natural disasters in the senior years. Students in Year 5 and 6 classes modelled tornados, cyclones, hurricanes, and typhoons. We learned about convection currents and how cool, high-pressure air moves to replace warm, low-pressure air. In some



cases, this creates a rotating system that can turn into a tornado or similar rotating storm. In the middle and early years, we focused on how scientists are inventing new products to help our environment. For example, we now have packaging made from potato starch replacing convectional packaging peanuts. Potato starch breaks down in the soil much more quickly than conventional packaging peanuts and does not contribute to our massive landfill problem. We are looking forward to beginning our biological sciences unit next week! Happy experimenting!



Digital Technologies (Digi Tech)

 $Foundation\ students\ have\ continued\ to\ learn\ about\ coding\ using\ the\ app\ 'Scratch\ Jnr'.\ Students\ have\ been$

changing backdrops, adding characters, and coding the 'Sprite' to move across a landscape. The Year One students are being introduced to the Chromebooks, practising logging on safely and becoming familiar with the keys on the keyboard. Our Year Two students are refining their coding skills by completing a range of coding activities that teach them to use block code to solve a range of challenges in Code Org.

Year three students have continued having lots of fun building and coding the LegoWe.Do2.0 sets. Students have successfully built models of Satellites and Spy Robots and applied code to add flashing lights, sound, moving motors and movement

sensors. Whilst the Year Four students have experimented

with a range of game controllers using the Makey Makey's to create circuits to control a range of keys on the keyboard.

Year Five students have been putting their knowledge of Apps and App design to practice and have been planning, designing, and creating an App that benefits and helps those in the community. Whilst our Year Six students have used their coding skills to program the Sphero Bolt Robots through a

series of mazes with increasing difficulty and technique required.



Visual Arts



We'd like to welcome Ms Linda Byrnes to the CEPS Art department. Ms Byrnes started here 2 weeks ago and is teaching art in the Main Building Art Room on Thursdays and Fridays.

The Foundation Students are having lots of fun creating their 'Wax Resist Jellyfish Underwater Collages'. Year 1 and 2 students are enjoying dressing a cut out person in



clothes to match their birthday season background. Year 3 and 4's are learning about Dream Catchers and making their own from a paper plate, wool, beads and feathers – this week sees these students using wool to weave the 'web' inside their dream catcher. Last week year 5 & 6's discussed 'Zentangles' and created their own design to which they drew different, repeated, intricate patterns into the spaces.





PE

This week in PE has been eventful, preparing our students for Year 4 and 6 Athletics' Day next Wednesday, as well as creating alternative activities to show case our students brilliant work on Mother's Day and education week. When students were not showing their classroom skills, they had the opportunity to further develop their skills of running, jumping and throwing through participation in round robin tournaments and activities that focused on offense and defensive pressure. Auslan

Students have continued to build on their vocabulary related to school and are working towards communicating about their school routine entirely in Auslan. classes have played a unique version of Fruit Salad. This has been a wonderful way for students to practise their signing outdoors and while having a whole lot of fun!


Library


FAMILY MATHS CHALLENGES
